Course description:

McMaster Children and Youth University (MCYU –<https://mcyu.ca/>) creates and delivers inquiry-based learning activities for youth aged 7 to 14 and their families in all areas of STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics). In this experiential and community engaged course you will have the opportunity to virtually deliver content to youth audiences, work in teams, practice leadership skills, train presentation and facilitation competencies, and enhance knowledge translation abilities. These learning opportunities will come through both course instruction and firsthand experiences as you deploy your workshops within the community (see “Other Course Information” below for details). Specifically, there will be opportunities to present synchronous, virtual workshops to youth in schools, libraries, and community centres throughout Hamilton. Throughout this course you will learn how to responsibly engage with teachers, parents, youth and other community members through your experiences in the community.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, as a MCYU facilitator, you will be able to

- i) Explain how to work effectively as part of an interdisciplinary team
- ii) Construct time management strategies to successfully meet all project deadlines
- iii) Demonstrate leadership and effective problem-solving skills
- iv) Exercise social awareness and engagement with community partners
- v) Demonstrate the integration of philosophical inquiry, performance and storytelling in communicating complex research concepts to diverse audiences
- vi) Reflect on your experiences and adapt as well as evaluate yourself and your peers

Format:

Three hours; one term

Prerequisite(s): Registration in Level II or above

Readings:

Readings will be posted on Avenue under ‘Content’ → ‘Readings’ at least one week prior to when it is expected that they will be read. There are only a few readings so it is expected that

these will be done before class so that they can be critically discussed in class and incorporated into your reflections.

Engagement with Class/In-class Activities: 10%

Participation in the MCYU community classroom is important to the success of your project facilitation as you will be learning and practicing skills that are essential to effective community engagement. This is a chance to learn from and teach to your peers while making meaningful improvements to your facilitation. You will also be asked to accomplish in-class activities with your group such as writing a workshop blurb and facilitator bio, creating a deployment schedule, working through provided scenarios, answering class discussion questions, etc.

In-Class Workshop Presentation: 10%

Each group must take the existing asynchronous workshop that they have been assigned and adapt it into an inquiry-based, engaging synchronous workshop (approx.. 30-40 minutes in length). These workshops will then be presented to the class on **January 25th and February 1st** before given final approval to be presented in the community. When one group is presenting, all other groups will act as ‘participants’ and create an evaluation for each group.

Critical Reflections (2 in total): 30%

An important part of learning is reflecting on what you have done, how you have changed, and what you want to do next. This is particularly important when working with community partners. Thus, reflection will be ongoing but you will be asked to submit 2 formal reflections throughout the semester. The first is **due by end of day on February 22nd** and is worth 10% of your overall grade. The second will be a longer reflection that considers your experience as a whole and therefore, will be worth more than the first (20%) and is **due on April 19th**. While these are reflections they should also critically incorporate class content.

Memos (7 in total): 10%

In addition to the reflections, you will be asked to write a short memo after each deployment experience. These memos will help you and your group consider how each workshop unfolded and what, if any, opportunities there are for improvement. They will also help in contributing to

your broader reflection assignments. These are to be submitted no later than a week after each deployment.

MCYU Facilitation: 40%

The bulk of your grade will be based on your engagement with the community. Specifically you will be graded on your presentation style, your ability to translate knowledge to youth audiences, your social awareness and engagement with the community, your ability to work in a group, and your abilities to think and adapt on your feet during facilitation. This grade will be made up of a combination of your instructors' evaluation of your workshop to the community, the evaluations of yourself and your peers, as well as the instructor evaluation of the feedback provided by community partners.

Other Course Information:

1. There are no test or exam evaluations.
2. Students who have taken 2MC3 will present the workshops they have created during deployment and students who are joining having not taken 2MC3, will be put into a MCYU facilitator group with an established workshop.
3. Three-hour classes will occur on January 11th, January 18th, January 25th, February 1st, and March 15th with time built in for group consultation. The weeks you are not in class you are expected to run workshops in the community. Your groups **must complete a total of 7 workshops** by the end of the semester. The number of workshops your group completes each week will vary with schedules.
4. Groups will book their own workshops based upon slots that are available through the "WhenIwork" program. Rebecca Young is in charge of scheduling and can be reached at: youngr20@mcmaster.ca. 5. Time expected outside of the class will vary with the project and team.

7. The course instructor, TA, and members of the MCYU Senior team will 'drop-in' on deployments throughout the semester for evaluation.

Assignment Deadlines & Missed/Late Work:
