




Message from the Director, Co-Founder Dr. Sandeep Raha

McMaster Children and Youth University (MCYU) is an innovative educational program that bridges the gap between the university and its surrounding community, and works to empower and academically prepare youth, especially those at a socioeconomic disadvantage, to aspire to post-secondary education in subject areas such as science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics (STEAM).

MCYU was born out of a desire to share the innovative research happening at McMaster University with youth in the wider Hamilton community. In 2011, Drs. Katrin Sheinemann and Sandeep Raha cofounded MCYU based on the European Children's University model. Our program objective is not to simply disseminate information, but to engage actively with youth in a way that would excite their imaginations, spark their curiosity, and inspire a love for life-long learning. Most importantly, we work to help youth understand how to mobilize their knowledge and creative imaginations to address more complex social and economic challenges in their communities. This philosophy inspires the central credo for the program:

QUESTION your environment DISCOVER your potential, and CREATE a brighter world.

VISION, GUIDING PRINCIPLES AND VALUES

To engage children, youth and their families in exploring a range of contemporary topics and provide opportunities for hands-on and digital experiences through workshops and interactive lectures.

In addition, we provide experiential training for undergraduate and graduate students in translating complex knowledge to youth in the greater Hamilton community. All of our experiences follow our central credo Question - Discover - Create TM

MCYU's network of partnerships is instrumental in providing opportunities for youth in the community, as well as McMaster students, to Question, Discover and Create. MCYU's dedicated staff and volunteers from across the McMaster campus work to foster a large number of relationships with community organizations throughout the Greater Hamilton area. In addition to our community partners, McMaster University undergraduate and graduate students form the engine that has driven the growth of MCYU. Our primary partners are the youth and their families who participate and fuel MCYU.

MCYU now looks to taking their youth-centered educational programming to the national and international level through our digital format, which is currently under development, and to further assess our community impact through a variety of research questions and pursuits. Our efforts would not be possible without the generosity of our donors, funding agencies, and the numerous McMaster University and Hamilton community-based volunteers.

I look to the future with great enthusiasm in developing a platform that will truly define community-based learning for youth and their families along with faculty and students at post-secondary institutions.

MCYU STRATEGIC PRINCIPLES

Youth and Family Learning:

MCYU will continue to develop unique approaches to facilitate family-based exploration of STEAM-based subject matter. The uniqueness of our strategies are a result of collaborative learning methods implemented primarily through our digital and workshop-based approaches where families and MCYU facilitators share the discovery process.

Exposure to University and Campus Life:

MCYU reduces barriers by providing transportation for youth and their families from priority neighbourhoods to attend oncampus events. MCYU holds "special event days" on campus where youth can explore the power of questioning and meet students with whom they can share their experiences and form mentorship relationships.

Academic Upskilling:

By developing critical thinking, creativity (and demonstrating the real-world applications of these skills), MCYU's workshops and digital-platforms significantly support and improve academic growth for youth.



Digital Learning:

MCYU's interactive on-line platform will leverage the power of digital learning to demonstrate how multidisciplinary approaches to learning can be achieved through co-discovery. The on-line landscape allows youth and their families to explore the application of various STEAM subjects through digital conversations and interactive activities in collaboration with MCYU eCreators.

Mentoring:

MCYU trains McMaster students to lead these workshops as "mentor-facilitators" and eCreators to develop our digital platform.

THE PROGRAM

The MCYU Program consists of:

- (i) The MCYU Family Lecture Series
- (ii) MCYU in the City Interactive Workshops
- (iii) MCYU Interactive Digital Platform

(iv) MCYU Facilitators' and eCreators Training Course.

As with many of the speakers, they do an amazing job, as did Felicia (Valcu)...I know this, when after a lecture, the first things I hear my daughter say is... "I can't wait to go to University,

how many more years now Mum?" She said it before we left the lecture hall this time. I can't thank the people behind MCYU enough, for lighting this desire in my daughter. Since its inception in 2011, the MCYU on-campus lectures have averaged more than 300 youth and parents (per session) from all over the Golden Horseshoe, including the priority neighbourhoods of Hamilton, as well as youth from the Boys and Girls Clubs of Hamilton, North Hamilton Community Health Centre and the Hamilton YMCA.

These lectures allow youth to interact with University faculty one-on-one and provide opportunities for them to explore their curiosities in conversation with University Professors. These experiences help to build their confidence and promote a sense of curiosity for young learners. A couple of the fan favourite lectures have been "Why Don't Dinosaurs throw Snowballs" and "Movie Monsters - Real or Imaginary?".

These lectures also provide opportunities to explore the post-secondary environment and serve to break down perceived barriers to attending post-secondary institutions.


Youth who attend 6 or more lectures throughout the year earn MCYU's Certificate of Knowledge. Over the last 3 years we have averaged about 80 graduates per year.

An excellent program – so pleased to see that you are reaching out to kids in the community – besides the wonderful lectures, the program de-mystifies a university for children – particularly those whose parents did not attend university. It also reinforces the idea of lifelong learning. Way to go!!



To extend the reach of MCYU beyond the McMaster campus, MCYU in the City delivers family-oriented, community-based interactive workshops for schools and community groups in the priority neighbourhoods of Hamilton. The workshops are developed by McMaster students using inquiry-based learning strategies designed to demonstrate our credo:

Question, Discover, Create.TM



We align our programming with various aspects of the Ontario Ministry of Education curriculum so that content is suitable for youth (aged 7-14) in grades 2-8. MCYU workshops complement classroom learning by demonstrating the application of the specific skills taught in the formal educational system. The workshops are presented in schools, public libraries and afterschool programs.

The workshops are designed through conversations with our community partners for youth to explore critical thinking in the context of real-world problem solving.





MCYU In The City Facilitator Training Program

MCYU's Facilitators and eCreators represent multidisciplinary teams of undergraduate and graduate students and contribute to the delivery of the MCYU in the City workshops and the development of the MCYU digital platform. MCYU's rigorous training program provides support in becoming proficient agents in community engagement and research communication. Specifically, they receive training in theatre arts, storytelling, philosophy of inquiry, curriculum design, principles of community engagement.



The work I do with MCYU in the City is a nice change of pace from my research, and working with the kids is always an exciting challenge. The enthusiasm they show for my field of study – and the university in general – always catches me off guard, and I've had to learn how to respond to these questions in a succinct way that isn't intimidating to them. This communication skill has translated into me being able to better discuss my thesis and research to my peers.



66 The MCYU Events were an amazing opportunity for my group of students. They were so eager to attend each month and would discuss the lectures and activities for days afterwords.


